

AN EMERGENCY ORDINANCE REPEALING CITY OF ALEXANDRIA, VIRGINIA EMERGENCY ORDINANCE NO. 1629, PASSED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF SAID CITY JUNE 3, 1970 AND MADE EFFECTIVE THE MOMENT OF ITS PASSAGE, WHICH EMERGENCY ORDINANCE DECLARED A STATE OF EMERGENCY AND TEMPORARILY PROHIBITED THE TRANSFER OF FIREARMS, POCKETKNIVES, DAGGERS OR DIRKS WITHIN THE CITY OF ALEXANDRIA, VIRGINIA AND IMPOSED PENALTIES FOR VIOLATIONS.

WHEREAS, on June 3, 1970 the city council of the City of Alexandria, Virginia passed and made effective Emergency Ordinance numbered 1629 entitled "AN EMERGENCY ORDINANCE DECLARING A STATE OF EMERGENCY AND TEMPORARILY PROHIBITING THE TRANSFER OF FIREARMS, POCKETKNIVES, DAGGERS OR DIRKS WITHIN THE CITY OF ALEXANDRIA, VIRGINIA AND IMPOSING PENALTIES FOR VIOLATIONS"; and

WHEREAS, the state of emergency set forth in said ordinance has been ended in accordance with the provisions of the ordinance; and

WHEREAS, although the state of emergency has been ended and the ordinance is no longer effective, the ordinance remains among the laws of the city, serves no useful purpose and may cause legal complications in the event of a future emergency; therefore

THE CITY COUNCIL OF ALEXANDRIA HEREBY ORDAINS:

Section 1. That Emergency Ordinance numbered 1629, passed by the city council of the City of Alexandria, Virginia, June 3, 1970 and made effective the moment of passage June 3, 1970, be and the same hereby is repealed.

Section 2. That in the opinion of council, an emergency exists and this is declared an EMERGENCY ORDINANCE as it is in the best interests of the public safety, health and welfare to have the repeal enacted as promptly as possible.

Section 3. That this ordinance shall not be published. The clerk of council shall note the date of introduction and first reading and the date and time of the second reading and final passage in the minutes of the meeting. The clerk and the city manager shall attempt to give this ordinance wide coverage by all news media. This ordinance shall become effective the moment of its passage.
