

ORDINANCE NO. 2096

AN ORDINANCE to amend and reordain subsection (b), subsection 1, Section 5 of Ordinance No. 2056, finally passed on September 23, 1975, which subsection (b) relates to the maintenance of seven oak trees, which subsection 1 relates to the erection and maintenance of a barrier of trees, which Section 5 relates to contingencies of approval and which Ordinance No. 2056 relates to sale of certain property owned by and located in the City of Alexandria, Virginia, in the vicinity of Route 7 (King Street) and the proposed extension of Dawes Avenue near the Alexandria Campus of the Northern Virginia Community College.

THE CITY COUNCIL OF ALEXANDRIA HEREBY ORDAINS:

Section 1. That subsection (b), subsection 1, Section 5 of Ordinance No. 2056, finally passed on September 23, 1975, be and the same hereby is amended and reordained to read as follows:

(b) That in exchange for authorization to remove five of the seven oak trees standing on the northeast corner of Parcel 3852-02, Jack Coopersmith, his heirs, successors and assigns agree to install, and for one year, guarantee a continuous screen comprised of seven white pine trees, eight to ten feet in height which said screen shall extend from the heretofore agreed-upon arborvitae screen to within ten feet of the north property line on Route 7. Two of the existing oak trees are to remain undisturbed.

Section 2. That the title of and an informal memorandum explaining this ordinance shall be published in a newspaper of general circulation published in the city not later than five days following its introduction together with a notice containing the time and place for a public hearing. The city clerk shall have the full text of this ordinance printed in sufficient numbers to supply copies to meet request. The city clerk shall note the date of introduction and first reading, the date of publication, the date of the public hearing, and the date of the second reading and final passage in the minutes of the meeting. This ordinance shall become effective the date of its final passage.
